### 2023 Progress Report on South Carolina's Birth Through Five Plan

#### **Priorities for the Year Ahead**

Looking ahead to the remainder of 2023, the Early Childhood Advisory Council (ECAC) has identified a set of priorities that will significantly impact the lives of young children and their families. These priorities are both ambitious and essential, requiring the active participation and collaboration of the ECAC and its partners to be fully implemented. By improving and enhancing the infrastructure of the early childhood system, these priorities have the potential to create lasting and positive change for South Carolina's children.

- Increase participation in publicly funded preschool programs. According to the Education Oversight Committee (EOC), over 50% of four-year-olds living in poverty did not receive services from CERDEP 4K or Head Start during the 2021-22 school year, and this trend is expected to continue in the current year. This underscores the gap that persists between eligibility and enrollment in high-quality early education programs statewide and presents an opportunity to increase school readiness for children living in poverty.
- 2. Increase availability of quality child care, particularly in high need areas. Substitute teacher pools, expansion and materials/improvement grants for existing child care providers, as well as start-up grants for new providers are among the projects planned for the year ahead. The projects are designed to decrease shortages in the child care workforce and to create more opportunities for families to find the care they need.
- 3. Recruit and retain early education professionals. Children cannot benefit from quality care if teachers and related professionals are not available. Activities to retain and recruit early education professionals include assuring that providers are aware of and use existing supports like training, and consultation. Wages are a real concern. Therefore T.E.A.C.H. opportunities, credentialling and smart money bonuses must be promoted, and new compensation strategies will be developed. To alleviate barriers for obtaining higher education, efforts will be made to expand and update articulation agreements between higher education institutions.
- 4. Provide families with the ability to apply for publicly funded programs at times and in ways that meet their needs. To streamline the application process for families, the ECAC has led development of a new application portal on first5sc.org. This will allow families to apply at once for programs across multiple agencies, state and local entities, and funding sources.
- 5. Collect, integrate, and share data to better understand who is served, where service gaps exist, and where to target resources and services. Integrated early childhood program data help stakeholders make informed decisions and target resources to meet the needs of South Carolina's youngest children and their families. The ECAC champions integrated data sharing initiatives that will make aggregate-level data publicly available, while maintaining privacy and security of individual-level data. These initiatives include, but are not limited to, the Palmetto Drive to 5 dashboard, the Early Learning Extension of the K-12 Longitudinal Data System, and the Education Oversight Committee's Education Data Dashboards.

At both the January and February meeting sombers discussed content for the 2023 Summit: W are Family. FVC also discussed communications strategies to share their stories with families and leaders across the state. In March FVC heard about work of the Early Care and Education Division at SC DSS. The work was presented in the context of reporting progress in the Birth through Five Plan. FVC will hear from the SC Inclusion Collaborative in April, and future meetings will include training in public speaking.

As we work to promote the value & benefits of early childhood education we acknowledge the importance of building cohesion within the statewide early education system. The Palmetto Pre -K Jamboree serves as one way we support the professional community that supports our South Carolina families.
